
The Breakfast Room



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The Gallery




Pitzhanger's Gallery was originally built to be Ealing's Lending Library in 1939. It was designed to fit in with the Manor next door. Soane loved coloured glass so the architect designed beautiful rooflights in the ceiling.



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The Library




John Soane loved to read. He had a large collection of books divided between his house in central London and Pitzhanger. This ceiling in the library is called a 'starfish' ceiling because it is split into four sections.



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The Manor



The grand front of the Manor is divided into three. Soane designed it to look like the Arch of Constantine, a monument with three arches in Rome. The female statues standing on top of the columns are called 'caryatids'.



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The Upper Drawing Room


