Pitzhanger Manor & Gallery has received £250,000 National Lottery support to help address the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on heritage

Pitzhanger Manor & Gallery has received £250,000 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund to support its post Covid-19 recovery.

Since the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown began Pitzhanger has suffered a substantial loss of commercial and admissions income.

Director Clare Gough at Pitzhanger said: "Thanks to the National Lottery and its players we can now look to Pitzhanger's reopening, and continue to build on the momentum established in our first year of operation. Pitzhanger lost all of its commercial income when it closed for Covid. We're grateful that The National Lottery Heritage Fund is supporting us at this crucial time – it's a lifeline to us and others who are passionate about keeping Britain's heritage open and accessible for the benefit of all."

The funding, made possible by National Lottery players, was awarded through The National Lottery Heritage Fund's *Heritage Emergency Fund*. £50million has been made available to provide emergency funding for those most in need across the heritage sector.

The UK-wide fund will address both immediate emergency actions and help organisations to start thinking about recovery.

Ros Kerslake, Chief Executive of The National Lottery Heritage Fund, said: "Heritage has an essential role to play in making communities better places to live, supporting economic regeneration and benefiting our personal wellbeing. All of these things are going to be even more important as we emerge from this current crisis.

"Thanks to money raised by National Lottery players we are pleased to be able to lend our support to organisations such as Pitzhanger Manor & Gallery during this uncertain time."

Like Pitzhanger other charities and organisations across the UK that have been affected by the unprecedented impact of the coronavirus outbreak are being given access to a comprehensive package of support of up to £600 million of repurposed money from The National Lottery. This money is supporting some of the most vulnerable people in our communities and span the arts, community, charity, heritage, education, environment and sports sectors.

About Pitzhanger Manor & Gallery

Pitzhanger Manor was the country home of Sir John Soane, one of the most influential architects in British history. Soane designed many extraordinary buildings, but Pitzhanger is almost unique as a building designed, built and lived in by Soane himself. Following a major three-year conservation project, Pitzhanger reopened in March 2019. The Manor has been revitalised to take it back to Soane's original designs, its extraordinary architecture restored for the public to see. Pitzhanger is a forum for creativity, debate and participation, reanimating Sir John Soane's vision to inspire and enrich our communities with art, architecture and design. Building on the dual foundation of Soane's 1800 Manor and parkland and of the contemporary Gallery, Pitzhanger unites the past and the present and inspires the future.

Pitzhanger had to close in March 2020, on the first anniversary of its opening, in response to the Coronavirus outbreak: this eradicated all of its commercial and admissions income. Pitzhanger is working on plans to reopen in a safe and appropriate way and welcome back the public in early autumn 2020.
